# ISPP AT 40: REVISITING CORE THEMES OF TYRANNY, INTERGROUP RELATIONS AND LEADERSHIP

A warm welcome or Fàilte to all of you! What a wonderful city to be hosting ISPP.

This year marks the 40<sup>th</sup> occasion where academics and professionals from around the globe have gathered to share, discuss, debate and advance knowledge concerning political psychology; the interface between the social system (social location, group history, politics, government, policy, laws and leadership) and psychological processes (thoughts, emotions, behaviour). We are studying these social and political dynamics at a very perplexing and challenging time in history. In line with the title of the conference we really are revisiting core themes of intergroup conflict and polarization, tyranny and challenges of leadership.

We also come together at a time, when the aims and goals (and the very existence) of organisations such as ISPP could not be more important. As outlined in the constitution the purposes of ISPP are to

1. establish a community of scholars and concerned individuals (in universities, government and media) who have a practical and scientific interest in the relationship between politics and psychological processes.

2. facilitate communication across disciplines, national and ideological boundaries

3. increase the significance of political psychology inside and outside academia; and

4. provide mutual support among members of their freedom to generate and disseminate their findings and ideas.

In 2016 and 2017 ISPP has acted to defend the academic freedoms of members in Turkey and Hungary and has established a donation drive to support at risk Turkish members. ISPP has advocated strongly for the independence of scholarship from politics.

It is timely to thank the founders of ISPP for their foresight in establishing this Society 40 years ago. The Society is going from strength to strength thanks to the ongoing dedication and service of members who have successfully steered the organisation.

- Membership is growing (we welcomed over 100 new members over 2016-2017);

- ISPP publications (Political Psychology & Advances in Political Psychology) are having greater impact and are in demand as an outlet for our scholarly

activities (Thanks to Editors Catarina Kinnvall and Howard Levine and the Editorial teams!);

- Small grants continue to support a range of diverse activities around the globe;

- The summer academy is now a core activity that serves to facilitate communication and excellence and build our community (Thanks to Chris Weber, Instructors and all the Fellows!);

- Diversity is increasing with a wider group of talented international scholars and a more diverse Governing Council.

- Internally the systems and processes of ISPP are being professionalised reflecting the needs of a larger organisation with increased functions (Thanks to Sev Bennett and Heather Schlabach!).

There are new initiatives on the horizon including a trial of a 12 month mentoring program for early career scholars. We are developing a more integrated communication strategy so we are better able to showcase what we do and why it is important. There are also discussions about the Governing Council itself and whether it should be structured differently to improve deliberations and decision-making. At the business meeting these things and more will be discussed – please come along and join in!

Anca Minescu and Peter Gries and the section chairs have put together an outstanding program. Thank you for all your planning and hard work! A high point bringing us together each day, will be the keynote addresses and I would like to thank Michael Billig, Linda Skitka (Lasswell Award, 2016), and Paul Sniderman for joining us. The program is bursting with talks, panels, posters, blitzes and roundtables. With over 720 participants this is one of the largest ISPP conferences ever and the rooms may also be bursting so arrive early! There are also a number of ceremonies and receptions where we can celebrate achievements, get together and catch up with old friends and make new ones.

All of this indicates that ISPP at 40 emerges from a very successful past and has a very bright future ahead. I do hope you have a stimulating and productive conference and will help spread the word about the virtues of ISPP– we need a vibrant and strong ISPP.



# WELCOME TO THE 40<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL MEETING OF THE INTERNATIONAL SOCIETY OF POLITICAL PSYCHOLOGY!

This is ISPP's 40<sup>th</sup> international conference. 



## FLOOR PLANS Campus Map




FLOOR PLANS Playfair – Ground Floor




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## FLOOR PLANS Playfair - First Floor




## FLOOR PLANS Quincentenary - Ground Floor

## Roberta Sigel Early Career Scholar Paper Award 2018

The Sigel Award is given to early career scholar authors of the best papers presented at annual scientific meetings in a symposium, paper panel, or poster session.

ISPP first announced this award at its Vancouver meeting in 1996. Professor Sigel, whom the award honors, was a distinguished professor of political science at Rutgers University. She was the author and editor of seven books and many articles and book chapters, mostly in the areas of political socialization and democratic citizenship. She had many leadership roles in the American Political Science Association and has served as program chair, Vice-President and President of ISPP.

All ISPP early career scholars who are current dues paid members of ISPP and had their paper accepted for the 2017 Annual Meeting are eligible to be considered for the award to be presented during the 2017 meeting. Early career scholars are students (graduate or undergraduate) and faculty who received their Ph.D. within the last eight years. Each award carries a cash prize of \$250.

There are two awards with slightly different criteria to accommodate the authorship and publication practices in the various disciplines represented in ISPP:

- The **first** award is given to the best paper written by early career scholars only. In the case of multiple authors, all co-authors must be early career scholars.
- The **second** award is conferred to the best paper with an early career scholar first author. This award allows for a senior scholar co-author.

Please nominate (self-nominations are encouraged) eligible papers only (note all submissions as papers; poster format submissions are not acceptable) and submit them to the email below by **January 15, 2018**. Papers previously submitted to the Sigel Award are not eligible. All submissions will be read by the award committee, consisting of members of the Early Career Committee as well as senior scholars. Two papers will be selected strictly according to scientific excellence and their contribution to research in political psychology.

## Best Dissertation Award Announcement 2018

The International Society of Political Psychology is pleased to announce a call for nominations for the Best Dissertation Award, given for the first time at the 2008 Annual Meeting in Paris.

All Ph.D. dissertations within the field of political psychology are eligible for consideration, regardless of home discipline. Dissertations should represent an independent piece of research that is the sole work of the author and gains the highest degree at the author's university.

Nominations are due by **January 15, 2018**, for dissertations completed and successfully defended between Jan. 1, 2017, and Dec. 31, 2017. **Nominees must be current ISPP members.** Nominations should be submitted electronically and must include a one-page abstract (300 word), a 10-page (3,000 word) summary of the dissertation, and a letter of recommendation from the thesis adviser or committee member, all in English.

## ISPP 2018: Beyond Borders and Boundaries: Perspectives from Political Psychology

In contemporary societies there is a constant and simultaneous tendency both to construct and to contest boundaries between people. This conference aims to take stock of the social, scientific and political significance of various forms of boundaries and boundary making for political psychology. Boundaries range from tangible to symbolic, from porous to impermeable, and from changing to stable forms of separation and demarcation. Triggered by societal events such as domestic and international armed conflicts and legitimized by traditional and more recent political actors such as the increasingly influential right-wing populist movements, boundary making is heavily politicized. The current refugee crisis in Europe and elsewhere in the world has resulted in enhanced border controls, in the construction of physical borders as well as in a surge of exclusionary, but also of inclusive stances in public opinion. Economic inequalities reinforced by the great recession, in turn, harden the boundaries between the privileged and the less fortunate. Boundary making manifests itself in everyday talk about groups, in processes of identification with leaders, with groups and with protest movements, in attitudes towards other groups, in individual and institutional processes of discrimination, as well as in violent and destructive behaviours. Defining and asserting boundaries cuts across social categories such as social class, gender, ethnicity, nationality, religion and sexuality as well as value- and ideologybased categories. Yet, many political leaders and popular movements strive to attenuate or abolish group boundaries and to bring about social cohesion by reducing social inequalities, providing equal opportunities, fighting discrimination, or facilitating access within the borders of a nation. Going beyond boundaries is a condition for enhanced cohesion, inclusion and empowerment. The opposing forces of making and breaking boundaries are intertwined and occur in parallel.
