

Call for papers for special issue of Group Processes & Intergroup Relations on radicalization and extremism

The journal Group Processes and intergroup Relations is calling for papers on the topic of radicalization and violent extremism.

Across relevant disciplines, such as Psychology, Sociology, Political Science, Anthropology and Psychiatry, there is broad agreement that social psychological processes, and more specifically group processes and intergroup relations, play a key role in the dynamics of radicalization and violent extremism. This special issue aims to explore the ways in which group and intergroup processes alone or in conjunction with other factors foster or prevent radicalization and violent extremism.

We welcome all high-quality submissions that take radicalization and violent extremism as their theme and explore group and intergroup dimensions of this theme. We welcome manuscripts with varying methodologies (experimental, applied, correlational), typically including quantitative research.
